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From the Artistic Director:

As the title of this event says; welcome to Grounds for Goodness!

I conceived of this project several years ago after reading a couple of books about the rescue of the Danish and Bulgarian Jews during the Holocaust and becoming deeply interested in stories and thought on times and reasons that people sometimes act in good ways towards each other, including across differences and in times of need. I started to collect varied stories, historical and current, intimate an epic, on the theme of `social goodness'. I gradually brought the project into the community arts activities of Jumblies, and into collaborations with partners in Toronto and beyond – and now with good friends in Vancouver.

In one of our early Grounds for Goodness explorations young composer, Arie Verheul van de Ven, brought ideas from a podcast he had heard about the 1995 Chicago Heat Wave, speculating on what sort of "social infrastructure" would keep people more safe in a civic emergency. This was pre-pandemic, and now these questions takes on new resonances. Our work-in-progress, In This Moment, sets words collected from conversation on this theme with our choir, in a musical approach that embraces the impossibilities of singing together over zoom.

During my research I discovered that another country that had protected its Jewish population during World War 2 was Albania. I read compelling photo portraits and first person accounts in Norman H. Gershman's beautiful book, 'Besa: Muslims Who Saved Jews, WW11'. This book and its varied voices inspired and provided the text collage for our piece 'Besa'. This piece, composed by Martin van de Ven and receiving its world premiere performance tonight, is a contemplation through music and movement of a first encounter with this history and these voices, by people (us) across a gulf of space and time.

Grounds for Goodness has now engaged with many people in different places – really and virtually – gathering story cards and exploring ways to express them through a mix of art forms. Our three short videos give a glimpse onto some of these ongoing creative adventures.

Grounds for Goodness will continue for a week of residency at the Heart of the City Festival, in partnership with Vancouver Moving Theatre. Following that the project will continue, creating a suite of new works on the theme of `social goodness', with a culminating event in June 2021. From the Composers:

Besa was a real labour of love for me, I was brought up in a tradition of the need to speak up for and protect the vulnerable in our community. Learning of the Albanian islamic tradition of Besa and its result of the saving of Jewish refugees was for me just another indication that empathy and community is a universal human value that should not only be explicit but taught as a cultural good. I've used the Phrygian dominant mode for the melody in Besa, this mode is commonly in use from India through the middle east into Eastern Europe. It's Jewish name is Ahava Rabbah and it Arabic name is Hijaz Nahawand, symbolizing a connection between two cultures. ~ Martin van de Ven

In This Moment was inspired by stories of resilience & community from the 1995 Chicago heatwave, and stories from members of the choir. This piece is the result of a long investigation into how we can continue to make music together while meeting on Zoom. Taking the challenges presented by remote music making and discovering what can be beautiful about them.



The words are segments (translated from Albanian) from the book, Besa: Muslims Who Saved Jews WW11, by Josh H. Gershman.

A slightly different selection and order of these phrases is used each performance.

Why we do it? Our home was their home We just did it. It is our tradition. We were never afraid. We accepted no money. We had only two rooms. We sheltered them. We had a large home. We moved them from house to house. They came out only at night. We hid them in the attic, in the woods, in a cave in the ountains, in a barn where I kept the sheep. We brought food to them there. The children played with the village children He secretly drove them to our home country, high in the mountain He arranged for them to travel across the sea to safety. Our neighbours never knew. The entire neighbourhood knew. We will defend you against peril at the cost of our lives. Our doors are always open. It was human-to-human - true to our faith Any villager would have done the same. We welcomed them all with bread, salt and our hearts. Why should we be honoured? I did nothing special. We acted from our hearts. If need be, we would do it again. Without hesitation.
